Types of Aid

An Ole Miss degree is a great value, and we offer many financing options to get you there! The Office of Financial Aid is here to guide you. Aid can come from many different sources, so understanding the various types will jump-start your financial plan.

Scholarships

FREE MONEY! Scholarships are awarded based on different factors including merit, financial need, and talent in areas such as academics, athletics, and music.

Grants

ALSO FREE MONEY! They usually require a demonstration of financial need, and are often provided by government sources.

Loans

Funds for students and parents that will eventually have to be repaid with interest.

Federal Work-Study

A part-time job opportunity (typically on-campus) for students who demonstrate financial need.

Cost of Attendance

Cost of Attendance (COA) is an estimate of how much it could cost to attend an institution when one takes into account various expenses, both directly related to school and otherwise.
